This AFRC recruiting

program was rebuilt from the previous program and contains a brand-new catchy logo, exciting rewards and a redesigned, easy-to-use Web site.

“I think you will find this new program to be more user friendly. There’s no qualifying or routing of referrals – they’ll automatically be delivered to

the closest recruiter to your referral,” said Senior Master Sgt. Jeanine Pratt, 301st Fighter Wing senior recruiter.

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Restricted reporting gives victims more control

Recently, Headquarters Air Force officials provided a greater opportunity for victims of domestic abuse and sexual assault to receive immediate assistance without first having to notify law enforcement and military command officials.

This 'restricted reporting' option is the Air Force's first-step toward helping to encourage victims to come forward while providing them a greater level of control.

"This is a tremendous help to those who need assistance and guidance but are resistant to come forward," said Vicki Majors, 301st Fighter Wing Sexual Assault Response Coordinator. "One of my main responsibilities is to ensure reporting options are adequately explained and then offered to these victims.

"With each of these cases, we want no one to feel alone. My office will assist in locating resources for a victim of domestic violence, make referrals to Family Advocacy, if needed, and in the case of sexual assault, offer the victim the services of a Sexual Assault Victim Advocate."

Restricted reporting is defined as allowing a victim of domestic abuse, who is eligible to receive military medical treatment, including civilians and contractors who are eligible to receive military health care outside the Continental United States on a reimbursable basis, the option of reporting an incident of domestic abuse to specified individuals without initiating the investigative process or notification to the victim's, or alleged offender's, commander.

"This option is specifically intended to give adult victims

additional time to make an informed decision, while benefiting from receiving relevant information and support," explained Ms. Majors. "The more readily available and accessible we make reporting domestic abuse and sexual assault, the faster we can work to help put an end to it."

Ms. Majors added the DOD is committed to ensuring victims of domestic abuse are protected, treated with dignity and respect, and provided support, advocacy, and care. DOD policy also strongly supports effective command awareness and prevention programs and law enforcement and criminal justice activities that will maximize accountability and prosecution of perpetrators of domestic abuse.

Currently, officials report that domestic abuse cases often go unreported in society at large. Although the victim's decision to report the incident is a crucial step towards holding the offender accountable following a domestic abuse incident, it can have potential serious consequences for the safety and welfare of the victim and other family members.

"We will do as much as possible to ensure these victims receive the care and counseling available under this new guideline," Ms. Majors said. "We believe the Air Force's new policy of affording these victims, who qualify, access to medical and victim advocacy services without immediate command or law enforcement involvement will encourage all victims of this terrible injustice to feel more comfortable and safe about reporting domestic abuse and sexual assault."

Tornado Season

Preparation, awareness is key to surviving any natural disaster

SHAW AIR FORCE BASE, S.C. (AFPN) — Driving to work Sept. 7, 2004, Senior Airman Joshua Hjemvick saw cloud cover and well-defined rain showers south of the base. Suddenly, the forecaster from the 28th Operational Weather Squadron saw flying debris from the buildings to his right. He stopped the car and threw it into reverse, but noticed more flying debris behind him.

In the blink of an eye, Airman Hjemvick was thrown into a life or death situation. He was in the middle of a tornado.

When it comes to tornado preparation, "everyone must have a plan and they need to know where they will go for safety," said 1st Lt. Nicholas Healy, a meteorology instructor at the 20th Operations Support Squadron. They also need to know their surroundings and which rooms have the strongest protection.

For preparation, a person should choose a room that has few windows or no windows at all. If all rooms have windows, the hallway is considered a good spot to take cover because it has close wall support for protection, Lieutenant Healy said.

When outside, a person should head for a substantial building or ditch if nearby.

When taking cover, it is important to crouch down on your knees and use your arms and hands to protect your head

from flying debris, said Staff Sgt. Rachel Marshall, a weather forecaster at the 20th OSS.

Other preparations include having a flashlight and a portable radio with fresh batteries readily available in order to get current weather reports. A radio is recommended since a TV set may not be accessible when taking cover, Lieutenant Healy said.

"The simplest way for people to prepare for tornado season is to know the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning," he said. "Many people get that mixed up."

A tornado watch means tornadoes are possible in the area. A tornado warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. If a tornado warning is issued, move to the pre-designated place of safety and listen to the radio for tornado information updates.

Tornadoes are measured by the Fujita Scale, which ranges from F0 through F5. The Fujita intensity is determined by the estimation of surface damage and wind speed, he said. An F0 is the smallest tornado and an F5 is the largest.

During tornado season, "be prepared and aware," Lieutenant Healy said. "If you know there is a tornado coming, take action."

That's what Airman Hjemvick did. He took action and remembered his training. He got out of his car, ran across the road and jumped into a ditch, covering his head and eyes.

Airman Hjemvick was not injured, but his car, unfortunately, was not so lucky.

WASHINGTON (AFPN) — *The following is an Independence Day message from Secretary of the Air Force Michael W. Wynne and Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. T. Michael Moseley.*

freedom and democracy. We earned that reputation through courageous acts of patriotism by our founding fathers and through bravery on battlefields across the world. Today we mark not a resounding victory in a great battle, but instead the day when we stood up as a free and independent nation and told the world we would no longer live

under tyrannical rule.

“This year, as you gather to celebrate the founding of our great nation, pause a moment to remember our heroes currently serving away from home, fighting to preserve the very same freedoms the patriots before us secured. Their efforts are helping us soar to a future bounded by limitless horizons.

“You, the men and women of America’s Air Force, reflect the generations of patriots who, through their actions, displayed the values of integrity first, service before self and excellence in all we do. Thank you for your unyielding commitment, and have a happy and safe 4th of July!”

COMBAT DINING-IN RULES OF ENGAGEMENT

1. Combatants will remember the President is always right.

2. Combatants will wear approved combat dress to include: Desert or woodland camouflage, flight suit, or any other military combat uniform combinations.

3. Combatants are encouraged to cover exposed areas of the body utilizing camouflage paint.

4. Combatants will infiltrate the Area of Operation NLT 10 minutes prior to start time.

5. Combatants will rise and stand fast when the President and command post members enter and exit the Demilitarized Zones.

6. Combatants will make every effort to meet all other warriors.

7. Combatants will express approval by pounding their fists or other items on the table. Clapping of hands will not be tolerated and will be viewed as a clandestine effort to contact the enemy.

8. Combatants will not leave Area of Operation

while assembled. Command and Control overrides all calls of nature.

9. Combatants will not smoke during the campaign. To prevent position detection, violators and their ignition source will be extinguished by any means available.

10. Combatants will engage in enemy fire, when violators of the mess are sent to the grog. The designated path to the grog is the ONLY authorized combat zone. Any enemy engagement outside this area will constitute a war crime and the perpetrator will be sent to the grog.

11. Combatants will always use the proper toasting procedure.

12. Combatants will participate in all toasts unless the combatant or group is honored with a toast.

13. Combatants will ensure their cups are always charged when toasting.

14. Combatants will keep toasts and comments within the limits of good taste and mutual respect. Degrading or insulting remarks will be

frowned upon. However, good-natured needling is encouraged.

15. Combatants will not laugh at ridiculously funny comments unless the President first shows approval by laughing.

16. Combatants will not murder the Queen’s English.

17. Combatants will not be given eating utensils for use during dinner.

18. Combatants will only use water guns and water balloons during combat.

19. Combatants bearing arms will ensure “clips” are empty upon arrival. All weapons (and balloons) will be loaded utilizing government furnished ammunition (water).

20. Combatants will enjoy themselves to the fullest extent allowed by military law.

21. Combatants will not grieve the President by questioning the lawful orders proclaimed herein.

22. Combatants will refer to rule #1 in the unlikely event the President makes an error.

Wearing AFRC patch becomes mandatory

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE, Ga. – Air Force Reserve Command is in the process of making the wear of the AFRC patch mandatory on battle dress uniforms and flight suits for unit reservists and headquarters staffers.

These people, who include those assigned to the AFRC headquarters and the Air Reserve Personnel Center, can

start wearing the patch now. Oct. 1 is the mandatory wear date.

The new patch policy does not apply to mobilization assistants, individual mobilization augmentees and full-time members of the Active Guard and Reserve assigned outside the command.

"Our Air Force reservists are proud to be Airmen in our Air Force today. As we try our best to be an 'Unrivaled Wingman,' we are proud of our heritage as Citizen Airmen. Our people want to be recognized as reservists," said Lt. Gen. John A. Bradley, AFRC commander.

"As an Air Force major command, we wear our command patch so people know who we are," the general said. "We have been a major command for over nine years. Our folks deserve to be recognized for the great work they do for our Air Force and our nation. We are 'One Air Force, Same Fight...an Unrivaled Wingman.'"

The AFRC patch will go on the right breast pocket. Unit commanders may approve the wear of one sewn-on, subdued patch on the left breast pocket, either a numbered air force, wing or squadron organizational patch. That patch will be centered between the left and right edges and the bottom of the flap and the bottom of the pocket.

People assigned to the area of responsibility will follow the guidance prescribed by that combatant command.

AFRC officials approved the purchase of the patches last year, and most units have already received funding to buy them. (AFRC News Service)

My Biz launched to self-serve civilians

My Biz provides civilian employees access and the ability to update information about themselves. **My Workplace** provides military and civilian managers access to information about their staff.

SGLI rates increase this month

The Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance premium rate increases five cents per \$1,000 per month starting July 1.

site or calling 1.877.786.2372. The new Web site is a great way to submit referrals, check the status of rewards and gather additional information about the program.

"We've always had good success with this program, because for every referral a Reservist brings, there's a higher rate of that person joining," said Sergeant Pratt. "Reservists are our best advertisement. They speak from their experiences and can relate with potential candidates."

Once a referral is submitted, the rewards will be sent to the Reservist according to the number and type of referrals made. Several of the rewards are commemorative coins based on military tradition. There is a silver-colored referral #1 coin for submitting one referral; a silver-colored referral #2 coin for two referrals, etc. There are bronze, silver, gold and platinum coins for accession submissions. After four accessions the rewards get larger. When the numbers are

tallied at the end of the year, the Reservist with the most referrals will receive wing or command recognition and may be invited to attend the national recruiting conference.

"Referring new members to the Air Force Reserve is easy and really takes no extra time at all," said Senior Master Sergeant Richard Ernst, 301st Fighter Wing noncommissioned officer in charge of personnel employment. "It crosses my mind when I'm talking to someone and I bring it up and refer people that seem interested."

Sergeant Ernst has been active in the program for a few years and has already submitted multiple referrals this year. The rewards program is based on the fiscal year calendar with the referral count running from Sept. 30 to Oct. 1. Reservists can begin the program at any time.

"I believe we have the best wing in the command -- I challenge each of you to scout around and refer a high quality individual, such as yourself, to the organization," said Sergeant Pratt. "So put on your recruiting hat and 'Get One Now!'"
