Take control of your career in the new year

There's no better time than the beginning of a new year to take a look at your goals and consider what you're doing or must do to achieve them.

Enlisted Airmen have a valuable tool at their disposal in "My Enlisted Development Plan", or "MyEDP," located on the Air Force Portal Web site. MyEDP is designed to help Airmen track their own careers and the careers of those they supervise or mentor.

"My EDP is a one-stop shop that highlights your education, training, leadership and job experience," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force Rodney J. McKinley. For Airmen who want to "play a bigger role in developing the future" of their

careers, MyEDP is a great place to start.

Here are some things you can do on MyEDP:

Virtual mentoring - You can upload documents, certificates, transcripts, packages or any other items you would like to make accessible to your supervisors and mentors anywhere in the world.

Outline educational and career goals - Under "Enlisted Development Tools," you can view the enlisted career path which can help guide your career from Airman basic to chief master sergeant. The enlisted career path outlines promotion requirements, education and training require-

ments, professional development, career broadening and key leadership roles that can help Airmen achieve their personal and professional goals.

Keep a journal of accomplishments - The journal feature on MyEDP can serve a variety of purposes. It can be used to keep track of bullets to prepare for an upcoming enlisted performance report or to keep supervisors and mentors in the loop about accomplishments or current events that impacted your day.

View career and educational summaries - MyEDP gives you access to your Air Force Personnel Center record information, Community

College of the Air Force credits and much more. You can view your past duty history, professional military education and even ancillary training data all in one place.

Discuss Air Force issues in an open forum - Using the MyEDP forums, you can give and receive input from other Airmen across the globe about issues that concern you from assignments and deployments to uniforms and physical training. While the forum is monitored for content, entries are not deleted, so Airmen don't just get the "party line" answers to their questions.

Did you know ...

How to utilize the Battle Dress Uniform winter wear

When referencing Air Force Instruction 36-2903, Table 2.2, Men's Battle Dress Uniform; Table 2.4 Women's Battle Dress Uniform; para 3.2.4.1, it states:

* **Gortex** - *Enlisted personnel* wear slide-on subdued grade insignia; *officers* wear slide-on or pin-on subdued grade insignia. *Note:* Gortex liner will not be worn as an outer garment. Individuals may wear the Gortex parka and pants while performing

duties in inclement weather. The parka may be worn without the Gortex pants; however Gortex pants must be worn with the parka.

* **Scarf** - Must be worn tucked in with authorized outer garments; will not exceed 10 inches in width; be all wool or cotton simplex, with or without napped surface.

* **Gloves/mittens** - Will be worn with outer garments only. **Exception:** May be worn with BDU without outer garments; leather, knitted,

tricot or suede, or a combination of leather, knitted, tricot, and suede.

* **Earmuffs** - Black (commercial design of any material). Will be worn with outer garments only and service dress uniform.

* **Stocking cap** (Watch Cap) is authorized for wear by those subject to prolonged exposure to adverse weather only. The color is restricted to black or dark blue. When worn, a jacket must be worn also.

In a world of high tech business, Air Force Reserve recruiting is taking their message to the streets ... plastered all over their mini vans. The vans, which are entirely shrink-wrapped in vinyl, sport a cyberspace-look highlighted with one of three critical Air Force Reserve career fields.

The career fields chosen — jet fighters, transport aircraft and pararescue — help highlight the Reserve's mission says Senior Master Sgt. Gary Moulliet, Headquarters AFRC Recruiting at Robins Air Reserve Base, Ga. "We absolutely love the designs being used now. These are better designs than used in the

past few years. They definitely enhance our recruiting efforts."

The final product is constructed by the advertising agency, Blaine Warren. Photos were compiled over time from various sites including the Department of Defense's Digital Video and Imagery Distributions System. Photo composites were compiled, then transposed onto vinyl sheets to conform to the standard mini vans owned by

the Reserve recruiter units.

"We have about 45 vans we would like to wrap but that's all dictated by our budget and the unit's manning requirements," said Sergeant Moulliet. "The wrap can cost a unit from five to six thousand dollars each. We have 10 vehicles slated to be completed this year; our newest vans are

Reserve's financial affairs transform to align with new technology

After April 17, the 301st Fighter Wing finance office, as we know it, will never be the same. As part of an Air Force wide change, travel and military pay documents processing will go to the Air Force Financial Services Center located at Ellsworth Air Force Base, S.D.

Leroy Babin, comptroller for the 301st FW, explained this is the biggest transformation to Air Force Financial Management in its 60-year history. It's part of an alignment with Air Force goals ensuring its 700,000-plus men and women are provided with the latest 21st century technology. Changes will involve a two-year plan to transition the back-end operations of travel and military pay from 93 bases worldwide (both active duty and Reserve) into one central operation at AFFSC.

"[The AFFSC] is a significant investment for the Air Force," said Mr. John G. Vonglis, Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Air Force, financial management. "It will save the Air Force \$210 million and return approximately 600 positions back to the warfighter."

The doors of this new facility opened Sept. 14, 2007. The 72,600 square foot state-of-the-art layout will house over 500 technicians operating a 24/7 service center by October 2008. After October, Air Force members will contact them directly via e-mail, phone and Internet for answers to all of their military pay and travel questions.

"The project will be seamless to our customers," said 301st Finance Management Chief Master Sergeant Amanda Combs. "Reservists will still bring their pay and travel vouchers to the Finance office as they normally do, but we are

changing the way they are turned in. It'll be similar to customer service — they will need to sign in and wait to see a finance technician to review their documents for errors and correct everything before it is turned in."

After the finance office receives the member's travel and pay documents, technicians will transmit them the same day on a scanner routed to the AFFSC, where each document will be placed in a separate queue for processing. The expected turnaround time is five days.

"Carswell will be monitored by a matrix for errors," said Staff Sgt. Sal Talamo, 301st Fighter Wing finance technician. We'll thoroughly check each voucher for any mistakes before they are transmitted so there are no extra delays in processing."

The Financial Services Transformation (FST) Cut-over Team is responsible for training each base. They visited the

301st in December to brief the comptroller and train our full-time FM staff. They will also take several Computer Based Training modules to prepare for this transition.

"We have the technology, the wherewithal and the capability to do this," Mr. Vonglis said. "We're at the cusp where there will be some confusion and angst because we're removing a comfort zone and venturing into something new. But we'll get through it and move forward."

"The confidence our Airmen have (in financial services) today should only get stronger," he said. "This is truly working smarter and making people more efficient. I'm confident folks will be extremely satisfied."

"This centralized service may not be as quick during the initial conversion," said Mr. Babin, "but we will be very well prepared and evaluate everything so we'll have a very smooth transition."

first on the list." The three current designs will be distributed throughout the command with the unit's mission determining the design.

For instance, the 920th Rescue Wing at Patrick Air Force Base, Fla., would be a prime target environment for the pararescue theme. The audience in Dallas, Texas, wouldn't understand the importance of this mission as well as the Cape Canaveral community.

The 301st Fighter Wing's F-16s were chosen to represent the fighter career field.

"These images are great," said Senior Master Sgt. Rich Roneree, 301st FW senior recruiter. "I really like the way

the pictures stand out and scream for your attention. We get a lot of looks when we drive around the Dallas and Fort Worth area."

The method of 'wrapping' a vehicle isn't a new one but it's effective. "By following the special care instructions," Sergeant Moulliet said, "each wrap can last an average of two to three years before it shows signs of fading. The best cleaning method is still the touchless car wash."

If the decal is damaged the van can just be rewrapped or they can take the design off completely. Afterwards, the original paint job doesn't appear any different. "We haven't experienced any damage yet," said Sergeant Moulliet. "Some of the older vans can be swapped out through GSA and the replace-

ments are then slated for a wrap, if the unit's budget allows."

The next step for vehicular advertisement will be for regular cars. "In the next one

to two years, decals, not a full wrap, will adorn Air Force Reserve sedans throughout the nation, much like the Army's current decal design," said Sergeant Moulliet.

IM service allows Airmen, friends, family to connect

WASHINGTON (AFPN) — For Federal Voting Assistance Program officials, getting deployed troops and their families engaged in the current election season is a primary goal.

Ahead of the November general election, officials with the FVAP, which fosters voting participation by uniformed and U.S. citizens abroad, are assisting eligible absentee voters who wish to cast ballots in their states' primary election.

"It's important that voters participate in the upcoming primary elections," said Polli Brunelli, the program's chief. "We have over 20 primaries occurring in February, so now is the time, if you've received your ballot, to vote and get it back by the state deadlines."

Paper copies of the application form are available at military installations, embassies and consulates and from organizations of overseas citizens. Electronic forms are posted online at the Federal Voting Assistance Program Web site at www.fvap.gov/.

Members of the U.S. armed forces traditionally represent an active component of overall voting-age Ameri-

cans. The total voting participation rate among servicemembers was 79 percent in 2004, compared to the 64 percent rate of the general public, according to figures published by FVAP officials.

"Voting is a both a right and a responsibility of citizens in our country," Secretary Gates continued. "(Leaders of the armed services must) do everything we can to encourage participation and ensure that our servicemembers and families are able to exercise their right to vote and have that vote counted." New assistant secretary sworn in

WASHINGTON (AFPN) — Secretary of the Air Force Michael W. Wynne swore in the Air Force's new assistant secretary of the Air Force for manpower and reserve affairs in a ceremony at the Pentagon Jan. 24.

Craig Duehring, a 28-year Air Force veteran, is a political appointee, heading a four-division department that deals at the policy level with Air Force MR issues. He is responsible for providing overall supervi-

sion of manpower, military and civilian personnel, reserve component affairs and readiness support for the Department of the Air Force.

"I know Mr. Duehring will do good things for (manpower and reserve affairs) and for the Air Force," said Secretary Wynne. "We will rely on his professionalism and leadership as the Air Force moves forward."

In a statement during his Armed Services committee confirmation hearing on Capitol Hill, Mr. Duehring spoke of the challenges he faces.

"There is the continuing challenge of providing qualified personnel to continue to fight in the global war on terrorism," he said. "We must reduce the stress on Airmen and their families who are shouldering the burden of repeated operational rotations."

Mr. Duehring also said he looks forward to working with Airmen and trying to meet their needs.

"Our Air Force family is the most important asset we have," he said. "I will devote all of my energies to improving processes, programs and procedures used by our people to carry out their mission of protecting the citizens of the United States. I pride myself as being a good listener, and I tend to travel extensively. I will keep in touch with our Airmen and their families by seeking them out on their turf."

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
On your mark, get set, have fun
